### Gratitude and Kelly.....by Wendy Weicker

Gratitude is defined as the quality of being thankful, a readiness to show appreciation and return kindness. I have thought of that definition many times over the last weeks in relation to our community, as I have seen the appreciation and the kindness on a daily basis. The Woodlands have been our home since 1988, and one of the wonderful aspects of the neighborhood is the relationships we build. Roger Harmon and his dog Kelly are an example of those relationships.

Roger adopted Kelly from the Pasadena Humane Society 11 years ago. From the notes Roger kept, the Humane Society was hesitant to have a man who was 80 years old, adopt a year-old golden retriever. Roger, however, was persuasive, and pointed out how his family was long-lived, he was active, and with a park across the street from his house, assured them the dog would have exercise. We are all glad Roger was so convincing!

Kelly has been quietly in the background for many in the Woodlands. For Roger, Kelly was a faithful companion, through Margaret's illness and death, and then for Roger as his health began to fail. Roger often said he did not know what he would do without Kelly. Kelly has also been there to welcome all of us as we walked by and from the stories you have shared, he has been a part of people's lives through milestones including marriage, the birth of children, children growing from toddlers to entering middle school, as well as illnesses and transitions.

When Roger's health began to fail, I promised if the day came that Kelly needed a home, we would provide it. Sadly, that day did come. Kelly was with Roger when the paramedics came to the house, and when Roger returned from the hospital to be home for his last days, Roger's family arranged for Kelly to visit him.

In offering a home to Kelly, my hope was to honor my long-standing friendship with Roger. I did not know what a blessing it would be. Kelly and I walk in the neighborhood at least twice a day and so many people have stopped to greet him and to tell me how meaningful he has been to them. I have had a number of cars slow down behind me, the window roll down, and the driver ask, "Is that Kelly?" When I say yes, people have parked their car, and come over to hug and pet him. I have heard time and time again how people would walk by Roger's to greet Kelly, and how he was always so friendly and happy so see them.

In the first few weeks after Kelly came to live with us, many called our home to find out how he was. Families came to visit him, as he had been so important in their daily lives. Others generously brought us bags and cans of dog food, dog treats and bones, and tennis balls to express how much they cared. People offered to dog-sit, to help with walking or whatever was needed so Kelly was comfortable. Every day I was reminded of the kindness of this neighborhood, and so grateful to see how Roger and Kelly were valued.

Many of you have asked how Kelly is now. We visit the park and walk every day, and you can hear his joyous whimper at seeing and greeting old friends. I know he misses all of those he welcomed when he lived on Bonita! There are still times when he will go to Roger's front door or the gate and wait, but it is not with the sadness he first had.

As we know from watching him over the years, Kelly is a smart dog. He learned to not cross the street, but lay by the gate in the driveway, and would walk off-leash at times for miles with Roger, or wait for Roger in the convertible when Roger was at church. Within the first 90 seconds at our home, he knew the cupboard where the dog food was and would stand in front of it to remind me. Now, he has many home cooked meals, and when the cutting board comes out to prepare his steamed vegetables, or the Dutch oven for his meat dish, he lays in front of the stove as an immovable force until his meal is ready. When the leftovers go in the fridge, he sits in front of it to say, I know you have something for me in there! He has also learned he can train me in

regard to our walking route. One day after work, I was tired and tried to take a shorter walk. He sat down and looked at me. At first I thought there was something wrong and had visions of calling my husband to pick us up. No, sitting down was his way of saying not today, and he pulled me in a different direction for an additional thirty minutes.

Recently, Kelly and I were walking on Hermosita and I commented to a lady who passed us what a nice evening it was. She said she had lived in the area 10 years ago, and was back for a visit. "I like the color of your dog. There used to be a dog that ran in the park by the Adobe and he lived across the street. It was such a nice dog; I wonder what became of it?" What has happened to Kelly is that he was and is loved by a small caring community, and through him we have been able to see how much we truly have to be grateful for.

### BEAR NECESSITIES by Joan Bullock



On September 22 I attended a Community Meeting at the Sparr Heights Community Center regarding the presence of a bear in our neighborhood. The meeting was hosted by the Glendale Police Department, and we thank Officer Joe Allen for being present. Several employees from the California Department of Fish and Wildlife conducted the meeting, including wildlife biologist, Rebecca.


Brochures entitled "Keep Me Wild": Feeding Wildlife is Dead Wrong, were provided. Attendees were allowed time to present their questions about bears and experiences with bears and receive feedback from the employees of Fish and Wildlife. The need to keep our environment free of invitations to bears was underscored. For instance, no one should feed pets outside or actually engage in feeding wildlife. The provided brochure suggested removing "cosmetic fragrances and other attractants, including bird feeders and compost piles." Fallen fruit should be picked up quickly.

Garbage cans should be closed and stored in the garage. There was a suggestion that Glendale begin to replace garbage cans with cans provided by Kodiak, which are bear proof. The Kodiak cans are advertised to be compatible with most collection systems. Cans in more vulnerable areas could be replaced first, and homeowners might want to consider purchasing their own can.

Some of the information I found most interesting follows: Fish and Wildlife will not relocate animals, as that has been found to be ineffective. Bears have, for instance, traveled hundreds of miles back to the site of a food source. The wildlife biologist, Rebecca, stated that bears are in our neighborhoods due to an increasing population of bears in the State. The drought is not the cause, as she reported that there are adequate water sources in the mountains. Rebecca further stated that there are approximately 30,000 bears in California today, about five times the number that were here in 1980. The statement that was reiterated and most impressed me was this; in the event of a conflict between humans and wildlife. Fish and Wildlife will NOT intervene. That being the case, individually, we must educate ourselves and make decisions about how we will respond to various situations. We purchase homeowners insurance, install security systems, and stock emergency supplies for the Big One, although we hope not to use these resources. Now there is another reality for which we must prepare ourselves. Fish and Wildlife quoted an extremely low number of encounters between black bears and humans. However, one internet site details names, dates, and locations of many persons killed by black bears over the past years. Another internet site says this: "There is no need to be afraid of bears, but there is great reason to be informed and prepared."

### Trees and More Trees for the Next Generation of Woodlanders.....by Marcia Hanford

Some VWWHOA members have been working for many months with the goal of preserving the woods in your Woodlands. In order to maintain and increase our lush tree canopy throughout this century, Mirna Stanley, Catherine Jurca, Mary La Croix, and Marcia Hanford have undertaken numerous communications and meetings, including walking the streets!

City arborists Dan Hardgrove and Jeremy Cawn are pleased with our HOA's interest and engagement. We now have a pretty good understanding of how city tree planting decisions are made. Considerations include the amount of space in the public right-of-way, which varies from block to block, and suitable and available species, preferably natives. Other factors include overhead wires, underground pipes, and proximity to driveway aprons.

The City has designated primary and alternate species for each block to be planted in new areas or to replace dead or failing trees. Viewing the list, our Woodlands group had thoughts about other selections that might be more compatible in some areas. The arborists are open to these suggestions.

So what is next? We need to submit requested locations for new or replacement trees, along with suggested species for the City's master plan. Annual planting takes place in the fall, so conceivably some of our wishes could be in the ground in fall 2017.

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
